A Day School by Jeremy Clarke, Saturday 29th September 2018, Worthing Museum Education Room, 10 – 4pm

The title is 'An Introduction to timber-framed buildings of the Weald, their development and dating for beginners'

This course will cover terminology, the development and construction of timber-framed buildings, the basics of building recording, how to approach dating a building along with a set of useful resources. The day will end with a group practical session using site photographs and plans to try out the knowledge gained during the day and demonstrate how a building can be interpreted.

Rampion Archaeology Event on Tuesday 12 June (7pm) at the Ropetackle Arts Centre in Shoreham.

The archaeological work involved with the development and construction of the wind farm has uncovered a number of finds that will enable a greater knowledge and understanding of the local past.

Marine surveys uncovered an aircraft propeller, anchors and maritime and aviation wrecks and revealed submerged paleolandscapes. Landbased work found evidence of human activity from hunter-gatherers after the last Ice Age through to post medieval-modern agricultural techniques.

It is for anyone interested in archaeology and keen hear more about how the Rampion work was carried out and what was found.
There will be speakers from Rampion, RSK, Wessex Archaeology and Archaeology South-East – and the event will be free to all.

After the presentations there will be refreshments and a chance to see some of the finds and talk to project archaeologists.

<u>April Lecture</u> - <u>Dr Jaime Kaminski</u> on <u>The</u> 'Near-Lewes' Hoard.

Dr Kaminski, of the University of Brighton, said that he was very interested in artefacts, i.e. objects made by human beings. He is currently involved with analyzing and studying star artefacts at Brighton Museum, prior to the opening of its Archaeology displays later this year.

In March 2011 a Metal Detectorist on the Glynde Estate found about 80 objects and fragments of objects below the crest of a hill. They were buried more than 3000 years ago, in a ceramic vessel. The Detectorist removed the hoard and took photos of it as he excavated it. The vessel was heavily damaged, probably by ploughing, and ploughing has removed a large part of the assemblage. At the bottom of the vessel was a basal deposit of 5 Sussex loops. This is the biggest collection of loops found in a single place – and locally produced.



Gold disks, tutuli mounts, bronze pins, a necklace were also found.

A rescue excavation involving the Portable Antiquities Scheme, Sussex Archaeological Society, and East Sussex County Council, then took place and 19 additional artefacts and fragments were found, including 13 amber beads. There was an Inquest, the hoard was taken to the British Museum etc. The process took 3 years, but the hoard should be on display at Barbican House later this year.

The artefacts belong to the Middle Bronze Age – between 1400 and 1250 BC. There are local ones, national ones and international ones. The 4 gold disks, averagely 87% gold, are the first ever found in the UK.

The amber beads represent at least 2 necklaces, with a wire core and a bronze spiral decoration. The closest parallels to these are from Northern Germany. The amber is probably Baltic.

There are tutuli mounts – conical structures, a flange and a nail or pin through the centre. These are possibly part of something else, probably some kind of ornament.

There are 3 palstaves, of the Rowlands type, composed mostly of copper and tin and weighing, altogether, 1.5kg. They were not made by one person.

There are 8 spiral finger rings, very complicated to make as bronze hardens as it's manipulated. The process of annealing must have been known to the makers.

These are not uncommon in Sussex – Jaime passed round a bronze replica.



There are 4 twisted torcs – also very challenging to produce, and we don't really know whether they were worn constantly, as they wouldn't be easy to put on.

To sum up, these objects are ornamentation for both body and clothing, and come from local sources, France and Germany.

Matt Pope's Tour 14th April



Matt Pope took a party of WAS members on a tour by mini-bus of the landscape past and present from Worthing to Chichester. Before we set out from Worthing Matt made some introductory remarks inviting us to imagine changes in the landscape during glaciations and warm periods over the last half a million years and in the future including the comforting thought that at some point Worthing as we know it will not exist!

It was a full day tour, stopping at The Trundle to look at the formation of the landscape north and south of the hill. West Stoke and Slindon

bottom for dry valleys and raised beaches, UpWaltham and The Mens for the formation of the Weald and Peppering Farm (Burpham) for River Terraces where Matt showed the group where work on levelling part of a lane leading down to the river had revealed elephant bones deposited in a warm period between glaciations.

One of the many themes of Matt's tour was the raised beach at Boxgrove which subsequent work has revealed runs from Arundel to behind Portsdown, and the related formation of a bay on what is now the coastal plain between Arundel and Westbourne Common.



Matt covered a great deal over the course of the day and for those who want to read more about the subject the latest report on the wider Boxgrove area is available from SpoilHeap publications for UCL Institute of Archaeology, M. B. Roberts and M. I. Pope, price £30.
