Climping WAS site visit

On Saturday 26th June, Dr Matt Pope led a group of WAS members looking at the ongoing erosion of Climping beach and the geological features that as a result are being exposed.

These included Ice Age deposits on the foreshore and Prehistoric colluvium appearing in the beach cliff. In addition, John Mills showed the group the remains of a well (see below) probably associated with part of Atherington village, which has been lost to the sea.



Further field activity including monitoring the profile of the beach and recording of features and finds will be scheduled for later this year.

'Our' Archaeologist James Sainsbury gave a talk on John Pull & Worthing's Stone Age Revolution in the Worthing Pavilion Theatre on Tuesday 15 June at 7:30pm
This was about John Pull and his excavations at the Neolithic flint mines on the Sussex Downs north of Worthing. He began the lecture by mentioning the flint mine complexes and then spoke about those at Blackpatch, which Pull had started in 1922. Pull excavated the shaft and interconnecting galleries. There were about 100 flint mine shafts here, but they have since been ploughed out.

He next spoke about the flint mines at Church Hill, Findon where Pull underwent excavations between 1932 and 1952. These mines being the oldest flint mines in the country dating to about 4600 BC. There were about 36 flint mine shafts on the hill and possibly more. These have also been ploughed out.



James then spoke about those at Cissbury where Pull excavated between 1952 and 1955. There are some 270 flint mine shafts on Cissbury, which are visible today as depressions and spoil heaps. John Pull never excavated those at Harrow Hill. Other excavators were also mentioned such as General Pitt Rivers in the 19th century and the excavation carried out by the Channel 4's Time Team crew at Blackpatch with the help of the Worthing Archaeological Society in 2005.

Many artefacts were found in the flint mines from axes, scrapers, pottery, deer antlers, shoulder blades of deer and pigs, some skeletons and other objects. James showed a number of photographs of the excavations, finds, people who were involved plus sketches, which Pull had done of the sites. Some Bronze Age pottery was found in the flint mines at Church Hill, which suggests that they were also used in this period.

It was a most interesting and enjoyable evening, attended by a goodly number of WAS Members. Thank you James.
