WAS Lecture April 23

Jane Clark, The Finds Liaison Officer based at Barbican House Lewes, gave a very detailed and enlightening talk to the Society, the last of the winter series.

As Finds Liaison Officer it is her responsibility to record and report finds that are declared to her office.

Declaration is a matter of trust, but with the growth of the world-wide-web since 1996 it is not unknown for some items to 'disappear' but reappear on an internet market place. During the two years of 'lock down' there was a dramatic increase in detecting, therefore new laws are at present going through Parliament to redefine what items should be reported as Treasure. At present to be classified as treasure the items should be gold or silver and a 'hoard ' is more than two items in number. The new law is aimed at protecting sites such as Sutton Hoo which, at present, is not classified as treasure and therefore need not be reported.

Jane gave a fascinating illustrated talk with reference to Sussex and the South East. Many items are easily viewable on the website https://finds.org.uk/ along with much advice on recording and caring for finds. Chris

WAS Walk the Woods 22nd April 2023 with Keith Bolton

Keith led the walk up to the woods around Nore Hill with a view to ground-truthing for evidence of the field systems which appear to have existed up there. From above, the lower fields appear uniformly cultivated and the higher area, an area of dense woodland.

Keith was using the data for the Secrets of the High Woods project (Dodd, 2016) which gives a sharper definition of the field systems in the area. However, the view below (Defra, 2023) which has been constructed from Environmental Agency Open Source data and a vertical exaggeration factor of 5, gives a good outline of the field systems.

Note that the route indicated on the maps is an approximation of our tracks through the woodland. For several of us, the walk turned into a stagger through the undergrowth!







We were able to identify the larger lynchets and enjoy the bluebells. A detour to the edge of the woodland allowed us to admire the view over Eartham and identify the Chichester Cathedral!

And as always on Keith's walks, we stopped for lunch at The Folly on the edge of the woodland.


