Our Friday activity in <u>Malthouse Field</u>, Sompting, has – to no-one's surprise – turned into another very interesting project, for which we need more time......(Shades of the lime kiln).

The original plan was to investigate the surviving flint walls of a small 'building' – about 8' by 4' in old money. That was last June.



With expert guidance from Connie, since then we have uncovered a well, lined with very beautifully carved chalk blocks, other flint 'walls' (some beneath others), a distinctive area of burning, and a lot of pot, some of it from the 13th and 14th centuries.



So we are planning to return next year. Backfilling has been done so that horses can graze again, but we'll be back. There is a lot more to be found.

<u>Saturday 17th June – Flint-knapping Study Day led</u> by Bob Turner

Seventeen of us spent a fascinating day in the very special setting of the Downs Barn in Sompting. Led by Bob and with Gill providing expertise on a viewing of the Upton flint collection, we sat under gazebos for protection from the sun and knapped happily to our hearts' content.

Bob's aim was for us to produce a flint tool kit which during Neolithic times would have consisted of at least 9 different types of tools. All members of the family would have taken part, with the younger ones learning knapping skills from their elders. Essential for skinning animals to provide food, fashioning wooden implements and so on, flint continued to be used prolifically until the Bronze Age when the use of flints decreased with the introduction of metal.

This was very much a 'hands on' demonstration as was evident from the amount of plasters needed during the flint knapping process, flint being an extremely sharp material!

Connie brought along a deer skin which a few brave souls amongst us (not me!) applied their newly fashioned blades to.

Towards the end of the day, Bob gave us all a lump of flint and tasked us (in 20 minutes!) with the job of fashioning a flint tool of some sort. We then went round to each person to say what type of tool we had made and what it would have been used for.

We learnt a lot and had a great time and many thanks to Gill and Bob for their tuition and for everyone who made it such a splendid day.

Jo Seaman - 'Eastbourne Ancestors – A story of life from bones of the past'

Jo is the Heritage Officer at Eastbourne Borough Council and organised the Eastbourne Ancestors project. The aim was to identify the gender and age of each skeleton in its collection. Detailed scientific analysis of more than 300 skeletons of people who lived in the south of England thousands of years ago has undertaken by scientists and archaeologists. Testing of the bones and teeth has identified the national or regional origins, age, gender, state of health, diet, and in some cases, how they died.

November 10th

James Bromwich – 'The Garum and Salt Industry in Northern Gaul during the late Iron Age and Roman periods'

Garum is a condiment made from the fermented blood and innards of selected fish. Being a condiment, it was something which was added to food after cooking, much as we might use soy sauce or tomato ketchup - it was the diner who used it, not the cook. James will discuss the French Garum industry and particularly that of the Atlantic coast during the Late Iron Age and Roman periods.
