The Malthouse Field at Sompting –

Investigation of Building Remains. WAS has investigated the building remains in Sompting Paddocks which may be part of a malthouse and farm complex known to be on this site in the 17th Century. Excavations have taken place over three years and a chalk-lined well and further flint walls have been found. Finds recovered include pre-historic flints and pottery from the late Neolithic to the present day. We present a review of the site in the landscape and findings to date.

WAS Study Day 23rd November

<u>Simon Stevens</u> 'The Archaeology of Death and Commemoration'

The study of human remains can be one of the most exciting and rewarding elements of archaeology, providing direct evidence of the condition (and indeed conditions) of our ancestors. Skeletal remains can harbour a variety of information ranging from gender and stature, to lifestyle and disease. In the exact opposite method of a modern doctor, the archaeologist may be able to see what was wrong with an individual and then work out the symptoms.

Perhaps a less recognised element of the study of death is the archaeological analysis of monuments associated with commemoration and remembrance. From Neolithic Tombs to Commonwealth war grave cemeteries, attitudes to the deceased can be literally set in stone. A wander around a country churchyard can reveal a surprising array of memorials and approaches to celebrating the deceased.

This study day will be held in Worthing Museum Education Room, Chapel Road, Worthing. It will start at 10 and finish at 4pm with a lunch break and coffee breaks throughout the day. The cost is £25 for WAS members and £30 for non-members.
